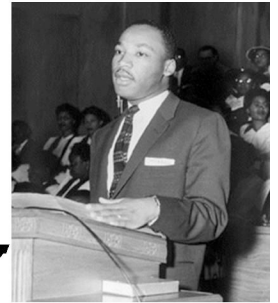

SHUT THE WAR DOWN

Fifty years ago, Black people in Montgomery, Alabama, were forced by law to sit in the back of public buses, and give up their seats to any white person who demanded it.

When Rosa Parks, a garment worker and civil rights activist, refused to give up her seat to a white man, she sparked the Montgomery bus boycott against segregation on public buses, one of the most successful and truly mass boycotts in history.

The Montgomery bus boycott also introduced to the world a young reverend named Martin Luther King Jr., who became the boycott's public leader.

Hurricane Katrina has shown the need to continue the civil rights movement. The survivors and their families must control the relief and reconstruction fund, the contracts and the jobs, and workers must be paid the prevailing wage. We demand an independent investigation-no cover up.
